International Women's Day

International Women's Day is celebrated on March 8 worldwide, commemorating the political, social and economic achievements of women. Over the decades the objective of the celebration has evolved and embraced culture and ethnicity to emerge as a celebration of appreciation and respect towards women.

In supporting this year's theme, "Choose to Challenge" students and staff were involved in a number of activities to inform and educate on how to actively challenge inequality and help forge an inclusive world.

On Monday 8 March, our Female Leadership Team, Phoung Nguyen, Tina Nguyen, Ruth Ah Cheung, Media Al Suhail, Jennifer Ashkar, Duaa Shanoot Jounga (Joy) Kim and Rosa Taoai presented on assembly an overview on the aims of International Women's Day. The students in their speeches also raised awareness of women empowerment and achievements through international female role models including Brooke Boney, Jessica Watson, Dr Mae Jemison, Malala Yousafzai, Yuna Kim, Greta Thunberg and Obiageli Ezekwesili. A musical item written, composed and performed by our Year 11 female students around the themes of "Friendship" and "Keep on Trying" was also streamed as part of the assembly.

With leadership being defined as a process of social influence, these student's presentations truly forged the agenda to make a difference for women and girls, now, in the future and within our school community. Congratulations to Ms Porter and all of the girls involved.

International Women's Day forms an integral part of the curriculum. In commemorating the many social, political and economic achievements of women and to highlight the work that remains to realise gender equality, teaching resources were distributed to Year Advisors 8-10. Students learning activities were completed during Year Advisor lessons in weeks 7 and 8.

A "Choose to Challenge" photograph board was also set up in the Hot Shots Café. On Friday students and staff were also encouraged to wear the colour orange. But, why wear orange? Orange is the colour chosen to represent Harmony Day. Traditionally, orange signifies social communication and meaningful conversations. It also relates to the freedom of ideas and encouragement of mutual respect.

By participating in Harmony Day activities, we can learn and understand how all Australians from diverse backgrounds equally belong to this nation and enrich it. As such, I commend the students and staff involved for their organisation of Harmony Day activities this year, with many students and their families participating.

- Women, on average, earn 25-40% less than men who do the same job.
- Across the world, over 60% of the people who cannot read are women

However, in many developing countries the rights the fight for Women's rights is only just beginning. Those of us who have the opportunity to live freely also have the responsibility to speak for those who do not.




WHAT IS HAPPENING IN SCIENCE


Year 7

works and how they are set up in circuits. Students calculated voltage and applied this in to how much energy is used in the home and in electronic devices.


Year 10

learning about DNA. DNA is the genetic foundation of who we are. Students explore genetic inheritance and diseases. Students were biochemists for a day extracting strawberry and


DNA in a test tube!

From UAC: HSC students: don't stress! Here's a quick and simple ATAR explainer without all the jargon.

It's important to remember that the ATAR tells you about where you're placed among your cohort (your rank); it's not a mark out of 100 or a percentage. Its only purpose is to help universities select students for their courses.

Of the 54.894 NSW students who received an ATAR in 2020:

- only 46 students (less than 1%) received an ATAR of 99.95
- 50.3% received an ATAR of at least 70.00

65.6% received an ATAR of at least 60.00.
