School pride is undoubtedly alive and well at Miller. This was clearly evident on Wednesday 26th May, when our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students collaborated together to host our combined National Sorry Day and National Reconciliation Week assembly that was live streamed into classrooms.

With our cultural diversity a strength within each individual, I would like to recognise Dean Watson, Aaron Webber and Shakiyah'j Rankin as student leaders and for their public speaking skills to share their thoughts on the meaning and significance of National Sorry Day and National Reconciliation Week. The more student leadership is encouraged, the more it flourishes with the Acknowledgement of Country by Sally McPherson followed by a welcome dance performed by Carter Duffin and Rozesonda Riley, simply inspirational.

Our strong connections to the community were further evident with so many of our families and friends in attendance, and importantly benefiting by becoming more confident about the value of the important role they play in their children's education.

YEAR 9 HISTORY ELECTIVE ARCHAEOLOG-ICAL EXCURSION AND DIG

On Friday, May 7, the students of Year 9 History Elective and Mr Charlier, Mr Podolsak and Practicum teacher Mr Farrow, travelled to the Chau Chak Wing Museum at the University of Sydney as part of their ongoing unit on archaeology, artefacts and historical sites

Before they toured the museum, students explored the University of Sydney's Camperdown campus, including the elegant, elaborate sandstone architecture and the various historic and modern learning spaces available to University of Sydney students

Once inside the museum, the students were guided through various exhibits showing artefacts (and some creative recreations in Lego) from a range of periods and cultures. This included a rare opportunity to view several ancient Egyptian mummies that form part of the historic Nicholson collection.

Subsequently, the students had the opportunity to handle a range of authentic artefacts from the museum's collection under careful supervision from a trained archaeologist. The Miller students asked thoughtful and insightful questions before presenting their preliminary findings to the group.

The students then had a chance to further develop these practical archaeological skills as part of their first formal assessment task on Thursday, May 20. Two simulated dig sites were prepared using a purpose-built sandpit. Each dig site included simulated human remains and a variety of artefacts, which the students worked collaboratively to explore using archaeological

With mentoring and advice from Year 11 Ancient History students, the Elective History students carefully uncovered the 'remains' and artefacts, documenting each step of the process before carefully removing the artefacts for further analysis.

Over both days, all students demonstrated an exceptional level of focus, effort, and engagement, representing the best of the behaviour, diligence, and positivity we see from Miller students.

On Friday 14 May, our Year 11 and Year 12 students were invited to participate in an evening excursion to Campbelltown Town Hall Theatre. The purpose of this excursion was to watch the play, Macbeth, by William Shakespeare. The play is studied as part of the Year 11 Advanced English course, and this opportunity allowed students to engage fully with the text as originally intended.

The on-stage drama left many of our students mesmerised, and the excitement was palpable throughout the entire performance. One highlight of the night was when Mr Shea and Ms Porter became part of the act. Due to Covid restrictions the staff and students had to wear masks for the duration of the performance, but it was a slight inconvenience compared to the excitement and gratitude the students expressed at the end of the night.

The Campbelltown Theatre Group performance consisted of cast members with varying experience ranging from professionals to first-time actors. At the end of the play, the actors, sword play coordinators and Director provided us with a 20 minute Q&A section during which our students were allowed to ask questions about the performance. NATIONAL SORRY DAY AND NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

On Wednesday, 26 May, Miller Technology High School Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students hosted our National Sorry Day and National Reconciliation Week combined assembly. Observed annually on 26 May, National Sorry Day remembers and acknowledges the mistreatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who were forcibly removed from their families and communities, which we now know as 'The Stolen Generations'.

National Reconciliation Week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, achievements and contribute to building a reconciled



Australia. This year's theme is **More than a word. Reconciliation takes action.**

At Miller, we held an assembly in the school hall, which was also live-streamed to all classes. The assembly was led by Dean Watson, Aaron Webber, and Shakiyah'j Rankin. Our assembly began with an Acknowledgement of Country by Sally McPherson, followed by a welcome dance by Carter Duffin and Rozesonda Riley. We marked Sorry Day by lighting candles as a symbol of us remembering and recognising the Stolen Generations who were taken away from their families and communities. Following the assembly, parents were invited to spend lunch with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, their student buddies, the Student Representative Council, and teachers. The marvellous food we ate was prepared by our catering students, who may have a future in cooking.

Although not all students could view the assembly directly, they were able to participate via live stream in their class-rooms. This year, we paid homage to and celebrated Indigenous Australians while maintaining our respect, and it was a huge success!

FOCUS PROGRAM

Over three weeks in May, 20 female students from Year 11 were invited to participate in the ABCN Digital Focus Program. This program offers female student leaders the opportunity to be mentored by senior women in business and it is always an outstanding success. Initially piloted by Minter Ellison Lawyers and the Commonwealth Bank of Australia, the program now provides hundreds of young women with the opportunity to gain insight into the skills needed to be successful leaders within the business sector.

We have a long and proud history of participation in this ABCN program. As usual, Samantha Tan & Maree Drury from ABCN delivered exciting face-to-face workshops face combined with online meetings with the Microsoft mentors using Microsoft Teams. During the online meetings, the mentors shared their strategies for developing leadership qualities, engaging and leading staff, and assisting the individual students to acknowledge and build on their leadership qualities.

Throughout the three week program, our students collaborated with their mentors to build their resilience, understand essential leadership qualities and develop their leadership styles whilst developing their skills through communication and collaboration.

Before the course commencement, only 63% of the students viewed themselves as potential leaders, and 44% were aware of their individual strengths. After completing the course, this statistic increased to 94%. The students found the program highly beneficial, and some of the comments made by the students included

- "The most useful thing I learnt was that my failures don't dictate my future and that my past failures can help me learn."
- "My mentor taught me never to give up. There will always be opportunities for us. If we miss them, we can try again."
- "I am/can be boss of my time. I can manage it."
- "Such a great program, and it helped me so much with self-confidence and learning how to be your leader."

After participating in the program, the Microsoft/ABCN mentors commented:

- "I enjoy the interaction with the students and learning from them. They often have very inspiring stories and so much to give"
- "I felt awesome after every session!"
- "I have learnt so much from the girls!"
- "The biggest change in the students was their confidence grow week on week, and they are willing to share more and have discussions."
