NAPLAN 2022

During week 3, students in Years 7 and 9 will be undertaking NAPLAN testing. NAPLAN stands for 'National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy'. It is a secure assessment with the tests being set and marked externally by the school with strict rules on how they must be administered. There are four components tested:

- -Reading comprehension
- -Writing
- -Language Conventions spelling, grammar, punctuation
- -Numeracy

From the assessment results, we can identify common strengths and weaknesses across the school to inform grade and whole school planning. Target areas are identified for improvement in literacy and numeracy, so we are constantly adapting our teaching to suit the needs of our students.

Improving our physical learning environment

Good facilities in schools should be designed to nurture students' intellectual, physical, social, and emotional development. Over the past months, there has been extensive construction work across the school to improve our physical environment.

The lighting upgrade to LED (light-emitting diodes) in administration areas and learning spaces is nearing completion. The Metro renewal program involving the refurbishment of the toilets and amenities in Block D is scheduled to be completed mid-term. Once Block D amenities are completed, work on the Block C change rooms and facilities will commence.

The construction of our new **covered** outdoor learning area **or** COLA commenced this week.

This purposefully built sports facility (basketball/volleyball) and outdoor learning area will nurture a healthy learning environment, helping students feel

connected, supported, and engaged.

Students need to develop habits of arriving on time at school. This ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities when they are most alert early in the day.

Further, research has shown that being late for school can harm a student's learning. Being just 10 minutes late every day adds up to hours of learning lost over a year.

In addressing lateness, our school policy has been revised.

- Students who are late on **TWO** or more occasions in any given week are now required to attend a Thursday after-school detention in the following week between 3 pm and 3:45 pm.
- Parents will be notified by text message on the Friday of each week if their child is required to attend this detention.
- If your child is unable to attend this detention, you will need to contact your child's year group Deputy Principal to discuss an alternate time.

We are committed to ensuring that your child achieves their absolute best at a school. Excellent, on-time attendance is a significant part of achieving this goal. Don't hesitate to contact your child's year group Deputy Principal if you have any questions about our attendance or lateness procedures.

Reducing the risk of illness this winter

As previously communicated, it is important to note NSW Health's advice to reduce our risk, not only of COVID-19, but also other illnesses that may affect our school this winter, including the flu. We can protect our families and community by:

- Take a RAT before visiting vulnerable family members or large gatherings and events.
- Staying home if unwell.

- Keeping up to date with vaccinations including the flu vaccine, which is now available from your local GP, pharmacy or Aboriginal Medical Service. Flu vaccines are free for all children aged six months to under five years or for a small charge for those aged five years and older.
- Get tested immediately for COVID-19 if you become symptomatic and isolating until you receive a negative result.
- Practise good hand hygiene by regularly washing with soap and water.

CHAU CHAK MUSUM - 14 MARCH



CHAU CHAK MUSEUM 14 MARCH

This term, the Year 9 Elective and Year 11 Ancient History visited the Chau Chak Museum at Sydney University. The Year 9 class undertook a course on how archaeology uses science to examine human remains. The class focused on the remains of two mummies from Ancient Egypt. Ancient Egyptians are mainly famous for their pyramids, pharaohs, mummies, and tombs, which flourished for thousands of years. Ancient Egyptians believed in life after death, but only if their body was preserved in a life-like form. Mummification was a practical response to pass into next At the Chau Chak museum, the Mummy Room contains the coffins and mummies of two people who lived in Egypt between 1200 BC and 100 AD. Their names are Meruah and Horus. The use of the Cat Scan machine has allowed us to view inside of the mummies without removing their bandages. This technology allows us to respectfully learn about their daily lives, including nutrition, health, disease, and the use of magic amulets and their cause of death. Each one of the mummies has a different story. By studying the mummies of Meruah and Horus, we speak their names again and remember who Ancient Egypt. While on the other hand, Year 11 Ancient History focused on handling and examining objects "artefacts" that originated from places such as Pompeii, Ancient Rome and Greece, and objects from the Stone Age that are more than 10,000 years old. This activity will prepare students for their first assessment task that will involve students undertaking their archaeological Both classes had a fantastic lunch from a Thai restaurant and ate delicious ice cream during the excursion. They all enjoyed the food and appreciated it. The excursion was great. Everyone loved it and learned a lot from it, for example, how mummies were preserved. Students even got a tour of the University which made everyone even more excited to study it in the future. We also got to go into the "Vice-Chancellors Room", a room that looks almost identical to the one in Harry Potter the movie series. The weather there was challenging, it was an adventure for us to cross the road with all the heavy rain was pouring. Everyone was interested in this excursion and gained new information about Archaeology, Ancient Egyptians, and artefacts. Our next excursion will be this Thursday to the Holo-

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
