FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK





REFUGEE WEEK 2022

Miller Technology High School celebrated Refugee Week 2022 through several exciting educational activities. Refugee Week is Australia's peak annual activity to raise awareness about the issues affecting refugees and celebrate the positive contributions made by refugees to Australian society. By participating in Refugee Week activities, we can learn and understand how all Australians from diverse backgrounds equally belong to this nation and enrich it.

Food is one of the most significant ways we can bring people together and share our cultures with others. We organised a morning tea on Tuesday 21 June with parents and carers.

On Wednesday, 22 June 2022, our school community planted a tree in our garden to symbolise growth, prosperity and new beginnings. About 56% of our students are refugees, and many were invited to write their wishes and dreams on eucalyptus leaves. Those leaves were then placed in the ground during the planting of the tree, symbolising growth and renewal. It is hoped that as our tree prospers and grows, so will the dreams of our refugee students.

Helen Al-Zuhairi from class FS wrote an excellent reflection after viewing the tree planting ceremony.

"Half of our students are refugees, and they ran from their country because of war or because their country is not safe. They suffered a lot. I hope they will have a good life in Australia.

The people at the assembly did a lot of beautiful things like singing, reading wishes written on leaves, and planting a tree. Everyone was amazing. Even students from a primary school came to our school to read their leaves. I like that all the students were confident. It's beautiful to see everybody happy and have their wishes and opinions. To all refugees, welcome to Australia!"

Our refugee parents joined us on Friday, 24 June 2022, from 1:00 pm-2:30 pm in the school hall.

The theme for Refugee Week 2022 is 'Healing'. Australia and the rest of the world have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to hit the reset button on how we behave towards one another. The pandemic has underscored the importance of human connections, and such lessons can help us in so many ways. Mainstream and refugee communities can draw upon shared hardship to heal wounds, learn from each other, and move forward. Healing can occur through storytelling, through community and also through realisation of our intrinsic interconnectedness as individuals!

IEC STUDENTS INTER-CLASS INTERVIEWS



A courtesy reminder that all staff and students have access to two eBook subscriptions. The two digital subscriptions are WHEELERS and COMICS PLUS. Comics Plus is accessed via its website, while Wheelers can be accessed via its own website or the OLIVER school library system. Both subscriptions can also be accessed via a free app which can be downloaded from either the Apple or Google Play stores. Wheelers uses the "ePlatform" app, while Comics Plus uses the Library Pass app. Wheelers has 1,800 ebook titles and 700 audio book titles. Comics Plus has over 20,000 comics, graphic novels and Manga in the collection.

However, there are still two months to complete the PRC by reading 20 books during that period including the upcoming July school holidays. Students must read at least 15 books from the prescribed Premier's Reading Challenge reading list and 5 may be the student's personal choice, including the prescribed list. Aishwarya has read at least 20 books since the Premier's Reading Challenge commenced on Monday 28th February 2022.

The 2 weeks July holiday period is an ideal time to catch up on reading and set a goal to read a specific number of books. Every student has access to the Premier's Reading Challenge website. The

Premier's Reading Challenge icon is located on the student portal homepage. Each student can digitally record the title of each book read into their personal reading log. The Premier's Reading Challenge booklists can be viewed either on the Premier's Reading Challenge web-



site or our school's OLIVER library system. OLIVER can also be accessed from the student portal homepage. The high school challenge is open to students from years 7-10.

In 2021, 4 students completed the Premier's Reading Challenge. Let's try and achieve that target and also improve upon it in 2022.
