SALT

On Tuesday the 7th of March, 20 selected female students from years 8 to 12 were invited to attend Supporting and Linking Trades-Woman Program (SALT). The program promotes females in the construction industry with the presenters all having a trade background.

Students listened to the experiences of the presenters regarding being a female in a trade and how they were treated when they started. After the presenters finished talking, they completed a short safety induction and then students broke into groups of 4 and each person started to construct a tool caddy for the remainder of the day. Each group had a tradeswoman working with them demonstrating how to use the different tools that would be used on a construction site.

All students completed the project and reported that they had a good time, they were respectful and excellent ambassadors for Miller Technology High School.
